ReimagiNation: Glenrothes is a three- day festival bringing stories into Fife’s New Town and celebrating those of the area on its 70th anniversary.

Produced by the Edinburgh International Book Festival — the world’s biggest festival of its kind — in collaboration with Fife Cultural Trust, this is the fourth stop in a tour of Scotland’s five New Towns, arriving in Glenrothes to help explore what seven decades of life have been like in the town.

Brilliant authors and speakers come to the town from across the UK, including Fife’s own crime-writing queen Val McDermid as well as a clutch of the country’s top thriller writers, broadcasters Sally Magnusson and Archie Macpherson, and plenty of entertainment for kids too — meaning ReimagiNation is perfect for all the family.

We listened to local people as we shaped ReimagiNation, on everything from authors to include to opinions on the future of Glenrothes, resulting in a festival full of activities, free drop-in events and even a pop-up Waterstones bookshop. Whether you’re an avid reader or simply passionate about your area, we think you’ll find something to love at ReimagiNation.






Glenrothes has always been ‘unusual’, has always had to strive for identity. Alone among Scotland’s New Towns, it was not designed as an overspill site for Glasgow but as a development to house workers at a nearby colliery. As the coal industry declined, the town became instead a focal point of ‘Silicon Glen’, the heart of Scotland’s burgeoning technology sector. A place where the industrial past and technological future collide; an urban centre built on agricultural land; a winner of Carbuncle as well as Beauty Scotland awards; a New Town in the heart of ancient Fife. Now 70 years old, can Glenrothes continue to survive these contradictions? What can its past tell us about its future, and has the New Town ‘experiment’ worked?

Chaired by writer and broadcaster **Richard Holloway**, this is the fourth ReimagiNation debate on the successes, failures and opportunities of Scotland’s New Towns, following on from passionate discussions in Cumbernauld, East Kilbride and Irvine. The panel is composed of historian **Diane Watters**; community artist and founder of Recoat Design **Amy Whiten**; and Glenrothes MSP **Jenny Gilruth**.


Eating and Drinking:
